



While the Meath men's team exited the Sam Maguire championship early they quickly switched their attention to the Tailteann cup and after a great display in the final against Down they brought home the first national silverware in a long time and congratulations to Mathew Costello on being named Taliteann Cup player of the year and also to Conor Gray for his place on the team of the year. Men's Senior Team

Training began in January with a combination of gym and astro sessions, which were very well attended. The season kicked into gear with the Feis Cup competition in February, where we were drawn in a group with St. Colmcilles, Gaeil Colmcilles and Senechalstown.

Early March saw the league campaign begin in Division 1A, following promotion in 2022. Stepping up to this level was always going to be a challenge without so many frontline players. The Black and Amber came out on top in the first game away to Ashbourne but unfortunately, we had to wait for our next two victories against Wolfe Tones and Trim. A couple of narrow defeats to Skryne and Gaeil Colmcilles unfortunately resulted in relegation. There were 35 different players used in the 1A league.

All eyes turned towards the Senior Championship as we were drawn in Group A with Donaghmore Ashbourne, Curraha and Na Fianna. First up was a trip to Ratoath against Donaghmore and as we came to expect from all the group games, there was little to separate the two teams with the Black and Amber coming out on top by the minimum. Unfortunately, a serious injury captain Niall Murphy ended his season prematurely, but the team would have to fight on. A fortnight later the 11th of August the opposition proved to be equally stiff from Na Fianna and once again Richie's young charges were victorious which left the team on the brink of qualification for the knock-out stages but also wary that with the way the group was poised other results could put us in difficulty. Another serious injury ended the year for the unfortunate Conor Gray. The final group game was a cagey affair against Curraha in Ardcath with Dunshaughlin coming out on top in a low scoring game by a solitary point. With a quarter-final to prepare for, all ears waited for the draw to be made. Our reward for topping the group was a local derby with reigning champions Ratoath in Ashbourne. After a titanic physical effort on the night and some wonderful play in the second half, hearts were broken in injury time with a goal that brought the curtain down on the season. The disappointment of the players, management and supporters was palpable but following a tough league campaign the performances in the Championship were excellent. Men's 2nd Team 2023

Our league campaign was always going to be a tough ask having achieved promotion in 2022 to the third tier of league football in the county. League games for our first team in Division 1A were scheduled for the same time as our second team in Division 2A. This stretched our resources quite thinly as most games were played without county players. The league kicked off in early March and concluded on the 3rd of May. We must commend the players for making themselves available for many tough trips and fulfilling all eleven fixtures. Our solitary win came at the end against Kilmainham and was preceded by very competitive games against Ballivor, Ashbourne, Drumbaragh, Dunsany and Nobber.

The pre-season competition saw us drawn against St. Patricks, Skryne and Senechalstown in Reserve Cup Div.1. The three games were played in February and provided an opportunity to get game time early in the season. Games were competitive and saw us beat St. Patricks at home, lose narrowly to neighbours Skryne and losing to a strong Yellow Furze outfit.

As the summer approached, preparations were underway for the Championship. The Premier Div.1 championship has been a competitive competition for the past few seasons and this year proved no different. Narrow victories over Skryne, Ratoath and Trim set up a semifinal in a replay of last year's final with Ashbourne. With the home advantage possibly proving pivotal we came out on top by the minimum and set our sights once again on headquarters against Ratoath. On a difficult day for scoring, we came out the wrong side of a tight game and suffered the disappointment of a single point defeat.

Playing a final in Navan is a great opportunity for players and the nature of a championship second team competition means there are changes and uncertainties as the games come and go. Despite the disappointment of losing the final we feel the consistency of the team will mean we will be ready to go again next year. The second team provides games at a meaningful level for players and will hopefully continue to provide competition and development opportunities for our players.

Coaching and Games

Overview

The year 2023 has been a transformative period for the Dunshaughlin GAA Coaching Committee, characterized by significant strides in coaching excellence and the cultivation of a collaborative and supportive coaching culture. Through a comprehensive approach encompassing targeted workshops, the establishment of a robust database of coaches and qualifications, and a commitment to a clear committee charter, the Coaching Committee has played a pivotal role in empowering coaches and elevating coaching standards across the club.

Workshops/Courses

Quarter 1 Foundation Course for Nursery Coaches

In the initial quarter, the Coaching Committee successfully organized and executed a Foundation Course tailored for nursery coaches. This course not only equipped coaches with fundamental skills but also laid the groundwork for nurturing a passion for coaching at the grassroots level.

Quarter 2 Bilateral Skills Session

A highlight of the second quarter was the Bilateral Skills Session hosted by Pauraic Burke. U11 – U19 coaches actively participated, witnessing practical demonstrations using the U13 Boys team. This hands-on approach provided valuable insights and tools for enhancing coaching techniques.

Quarter 2 Classroom Session on Responsibility and Respect

Marc Leddy led an impactful classroom session emphasizing the importance of responsibility and respect on the pitch. Coaches delved into fostering a positive team environment, instilling core values essential for player development beyond the technical aspects of the game.

Quarter 3 Go Games Coach Education Session

Owen McGrath spearheaded a comprehensive Go Games Coach Education Session. The combination of a classroom component and a practical pitch session, facilitated by Pauraic Burke with the Girls U12 team, contributed to a well-rounded educational experience for coaches.

Quarter 4 Transition Phase Workshop

The final quarter featured a Transition Phase Workshop with Robbie Brennan leading a classroom session and Jenny Rispin conducting a pitch session. This holistic approach addressed the unique challenges associated with transitioning players to higher levels, ensuring coaches are well-equipped for the developmental journey.

Database of Coaches and Qualifications

Recognizing the importance of standardized coaching, the Coaching Committee established a comprehensive database of coaches and their qualifications. This initiative ensures that coaching standards remain consistently high across the club and enables strategic planning for future coaching development.

Committee Charter

The Coaching Committee's has developed their committee charter to delineate the parameters of roles and responsibilities, and collective goals. Their primary focus centres on providing unwavering support to coaches and raising the overall standards of coaching within the club. This commitment is embodied in our committee charter, emphasizing mentorship, strategic planning, and continuous professional development. By fostering a collaborative environment that encourages shared knowledge and innovation, we collectively strive to enhance the coaching experience for every member, contributing to the long-term success of the club. The committee's pathway aligns closely with the Club Football Pathway Plan and LGFA pathway from Dunganny, providing a structured and purposeful framework for development.

Club Coaching Framework

Led my Martin Reilly, the developed player pathway, consisting of five key stages, serves as a flexible guide for coaches in facilitating player development. Emphasizing adaptability, the framework acknowledges that each child develops at their own pace, ensuring a supportive and inclusive environment. Within the Coaching Framework, key player pathway milestones were identified. These milestones showcase the developmental journey available to all players within the club, offering clear progression markers and growth opportunities.

Conclusion

As the Dunshaughlin GAA Coaching Committee concludes the year, we express profound gratitude to coaches, stakeholders, and the larger club community for their unwavering support. Reflecting on our achievements, we are inspired to continue fostering a culture of continuous improvement and excellence in coaching. The collaborative efforts of our coaches and committee members have laid a robust foundation for the ongoing success of our players and the holistic growth of the club. Anticipating another year of shared accomplishments, we look forward to furthering our commitment to growth, development, and excellence in coaching.

Administration

The executive committee met 8 times in 2022 and the subcommittee structure consisting of: (i) Coaching & Games (ii) Football, with separate committees for adult men & juvenile boys (iii) Royal Gaels (iv) Finance & Fundraising (v) Buildings/Facilities/Pitches (vi) Communications (vii) Health, Well Being, Culture and Inclusion and (viii) a Strategic Development group looking at future medium and long term plans continued to operate reporting to the Executive.

Facilities Committee

The sub-committee held five meeting during the year. The following work is completed or in the progress.

- Five security cameras, two internal and three external and a CCTV monitor installed at the clubhouse.
- An expected drawing from an outside contractor for drainage plans in the car park was not completed after a wait of a year, so we went ahead with installing a number of drains ourselves.
- New gullies were also installed at the gate to limit flows of water from the main road.
- A channel was dug from the clubhouse to the gate and along the inside of the roadside wall for ducting to enable the later installation of lighting in the car park.
- A semi-circular planting area was constructed under the gym window and planted to minimise the fall in that area when it is tarmacked.
- Two loads of '804' sand/gravel were spread on the car park to minimise potholes. Thanks to GEM Construction for spreading the first load in May and Minnis who spread the second load in October.
- The external roadside wall was painted.
- Work by Minnis on the preparation of a new walkway is ongoing.
- Ducting for electrical cables has been placed under the proposed walkway.
- JNC Fencing will erect a fence similar to the one on Pitch 2.
- A Supporters' Wall will be built at the corner of the pitch beside the clubhouse. Supporters can buy plaques for the wall at €200 per plaque to help fund the fence.
- The pitches were regularly mowed during the year by Jim Smith and Pat Maloney along with help on strimming by Andy Byrne.
- A new set of sideline and goal flags with club crest has been bought for use in important championship games only.
- The club has negotiated access to training pitches at Dunshaughlin Community College, thanks to the work of club chairman, Frank Gallogly.

- We have made an application for Sports Capital Funding for two auto-mowers, costing €32,000. Our application is for €26,000.
- We hosted a number of championship games during the year. Thanks to all who helped out, especially our regular gateman, Liam Carey, and best wishes to one of our regular stewards, Gabriel King.
- Thanks to Ultan Blake for constant work and revision of drawings for the walkway and Supporters Wall; to Adam McDermott for design and drawing work in connection with the Supporters' Wall; to John Hayes for design of a retaining wall on a section of the walkway; to Seamus Traynor for sorting replacement lighting at the entrance lobby and in the external toilets and with central heating issues at the start of the year; to Kenny McTigue for plumbing repairs -all this work was done free of charge.
- Thanks to Alan Quirke of Phasor for sorting out plumbing issues and installing timer on gym and internal lobby lights.

Issues to be Addressed:

- Tarmac on the car park. Early in the year there were discussions with the Department of Education about laying tarmac on part of the car-park. There has been no recent follow-up from the Department but we expect renewed discussions in the coming year. Thanks to the late lamented Damien O Reilly, RIP, County Councillor for his assistance with this.
- To keep the clubhouse and dressing-rooms clean, a rota system of cleaning, or the employment of commercial cleaners is essential.
- Maintenance of the pitches is too demanding for the men doing the job on a completely voluntary basis. The provision of auto-mowers will reduce this workload, if our Sports Capital application is successful.
- Pitch 2 is in poor condition and needs repair and a rest from games and especially training. Early season training should be conducted in the gym, Astro and Community College grounds, where temporary lighting may be required.
- We would urge mentors to consider the condition of pitches when training. Too often areas
 that are badly worn near the goals are chosen for drills, shuttle runs etc. with serious
 consequent damage. I rarely see groups selecting grassy, unworn areas away from damaged
 areas for such work.
- We need to reduce the amount of plastic refuse at the club, especially water bottles, often
 left on the playing fields, full or partly full, after training and games. They make up the bulk of
 our refuse collection and create a hazard for the mowers when left on the pitch.
- Goal guards have been provided to protect goal areas, but mentors need to ensure that when
 they are unlocked and removed the keys are relocked on the chains, as otherwise they fall off
 and are lost and also damage mowers. To date twenty different locks have had to be provided
 to replace missing locks.

Finance & Fundraising

2023 was the first year of our agreement with our platinum sponsor Grace Healthcare and we thank them for their ongoing contribution to the club as it provides a strong base for us as we continue to grow and expand our membership.

Also, our longstanding partnership with Supervalu has continued and we are continuing to look for other partners.

Thanks, you to the sponsorship committee driven by Fergus Clancy and Dave McEntee under the stewardship of our Treasurer Pauric McGovern and assisted by Paul Sheehy for their efforts in 2022 in securing sponsorship for our signs – this is important development as it should secure a good stream of recurring revenue for the club.

Yet again Jim Smith ran the highly successful Golf Classic and brought in a notable net return of over €11,000. Thanks to all our loyal supporters who supported the event and a special thanks to Jim, who single-handedly organised and oversaw the event. He certainly epitomises the volunteer spirit that is central to the success of the GAA.

We are lucky to have an agreement with the Department of Education to locate Dunshaughlin Community National School on our grounds and the regular rental income is a big bonus in our budgetary planning for the club. We are currently in negotiations with the Dept of Education in terms of extending the agreement

In terms of our regular day-to-day income the online Lotto has continued and whilst online sales have dropped slightly from a high of €1200 it remains an important part of our income stream in addition rata in additional to sales at SuperValu, Gills Dry Cleaners etc. We would ask all members to participate if possible

Thanks, to the Lotto team headed by Jim Smith with great assistance from Caroline Malone, Oliver Gogan and Christy Purcell.

We are looking to see if having a coffee shop as a permanent feature at the grounds during games and busy times is a viable proposition and despite efforts, we have been unable to secure a tenant/partner. If anyone knows of any opportunities, please let us know

We also launched our "Be on the Wall" campaign and while sales have been steady we need people to commit to the project to ensure we can complete the development of the fence and walkway

Membership

Teresa Ennis as registrar ably assisted by Mairead Delaney ensured that that membership was collected and recorded, so that players have the benefit of the Players' Injury Scheme. We have continued to maintain the same level of membership fees and would ask that people register and pay as soon as possible using the Foireann application

Health & Well Being

The Health & Well Being Sub Committee was established in January 2022 and is in its second year of existence. In 2022, the club was accepted as part of the national programme for GAA Healthy Clubs and in October this year, the culmination of this work has been recognised and the Club was conferred as a *Foundation Healthy Club*. at the National GAA Awards Ceremony on Thursday 19th Oct, Killeshin Hotel, Portlaoise.

The Committee hosted a number of events and activities this year as part of the brief to promote wellbeing, inclusion, cultural diversity, and a sense of community.

The mission of the Health & Well Being Committee is to.

- Promote awareness on health and well-being matters and provide resources for club members, including signposting appropriate services to support members who encounter well-being issues.
- Ensure the club promotes and delivers social activities that promote health and inclusion for the benefit of the members and the wider community.
- Promote Gaelic cultural events in the club.
- Promote the general principles of inclusion and cultural diversity within the club.
- Engage with the wider community networks to build social capital in the community.

- The Club entered a boys' team in Meath Scor Quiz in O Mathuna, CLG, Feb 24th, 2023.
- The Player Welfare Officer role was developed and presented to the Club Executive.
- Assisted in facilitating the start-up of Dunshaughlin's Chess Club, run by Barry Higgins

April -June 2023

- Meath Seachtain na Gaeilge events were hosted throughout the county. On Saturday 11th March, the Club hosted an event Circus performer/ Storyteller who performed for the children "as Gaeilge" and football skills & drills were undertaken on the Astro pitch "as Gaeilge". - Resumption of the All-Stars Programme for children with additional needs in early April

After Meath's recent victory in the Tailteann Cup final, manager Colm O Rourke, reflecting on the tragedies that recently hit the Kealy family, described them as 'the most wonderful GAA family in the country.' Few families can match the Kealys' level of GAA involvement and success and few have been hit so cruelly in recent times. The untimely death of Maria last December was followed by the equally heart wrenching death of Denis in June. Two young stars of the game and of life gone way too soon.

Football ability coursed through the veins of all members of the family. In December 1993 Denis made his first adult championship appearance. Nothing unusual about that. The game was an Under 21 championship refixture between Dunshaughlin and Seneschalstown as the original encounter came to a premature end when referee Joe Harlin was doused with water and promptly abandoned the game. That was certainly unusual. Denis came on as a sub but the most extraordinary aspect of it was that he was then just 14 years old. It couldn't happen nowadays, but it speaks volumes for the regard in which Denis was held, even from his youngest years.

From then until his final senior game in 2015, Denis was an outstanding player who combined consummate skill, steely determination, commitment and bravery in a stellar career. He played in five senior county finals, winning three in successive years, 2000-02, crowning the third with a Leinster

club title. He also won an intermediate championship in 1997. His leadership qualities were evident in winning the Under 21 A title in 2000, seven years after his first appearance in the grade, and he was club captain in 2009. He also represented the Royal County at minor, Under 21 and senior level.

Denis was versatile and skilful, featuring in attack in his youth before reverting to defence, where he was the epitome of determination and top-class defending. Always the go-to man to mark the opposition's best player, he often had to stifle his own natural talent in the interest of the team. His tussles with Rathnew and Wicklow's Tommy Gill in the Leinster club championship remains the stuff of legend. The clubs met eight times in three years and Denis played in them all, invariably triumphing in his tussles with the Wicklow star. Denis's sporting talent stretched beyond the GAA into athletics and soccer. He represented Meath in the Community Games athletics finals and captained the North Eastern Schoolboys at soccer.

Off the field Denis was both a gentleman and a gentle man, quietly spoken, engaging and chatty who always made time for everyone. He started his own business, Keamc Building Contractors, to which he brought his determination, skill and single-mindedness, developing a reputation for quality work and the personal touch.

He was always available to the club with his building expertise and played a major role in completing the clubhouse and entrance to the club in the last two years. His company also provided generous sponsorship and in recent years he was once again a regular in the club at weekends and evenings as his young boys became involved at underage level.

Maria was a prominent star of ladies' football in the county at a time when it didn't attract the same attention or interest as it does currently. Like Denis, she mixed talent and determination in equal measure on and off the playing field.

She captained Meath to an All-Ireland Under 16 title in 2000 and won Leinster minors in 2001 and 2002. With Royal Gaels she won an intermediate title in 2007. Then, to show she could replicate her playing success as a coach, she mentored the 2009 Under 16s to an All-Ireland and a decade later coached the Royals to a provincial minor title, the first since 2002.

She worked as a committed Coaching and Games Officer with Meath GAA before establishing her own business MA.KE Health in Kilmessan and Drogheda. She assisted Kilmessan hurling and camogie clubs and club members from far and near. Her gyms were go-to locations for footballers, hurlers and jockeys seeking help with injuries and rehabilitation. Her can-do approach combined with her everpresent smile and bubbly enthusiasm brought out the best in everyone.

She was a huge supporter of ChildVision Ireland and the charity fittingly described Maria as 'a blinding ray of sunshine wrapped up in an unstoppable force of energy.'

Denis and Maria were alike in many ways: they were the two youngest members of the Kealy family; they were both successful in the sporting world; they brought their talent and leadership on the field into business off it, both building successful enterprises from scratch based on a commitment of heart and soul to every task. Sadly, they were both taken within months of each other.

To their partners, Charlene and Micky, both of whom were Gaelic games stalwarts also, the whole GAA community sends its sympathy. Charlene won junior and intermediate titles in the club's black

and amber, teams that also featured Maria, while she was also a Meath senior. Micky and his brothers Anthony and Tommy were regulars with the club from the mid 2000s. We remember Denis and Charlene's young children, Ciarán, Daniel and Evan, Denis and Maria's brothers and sisters Kevin, Orla, Pat, Dermot, Brendan, Aidan, Richie and Fiona, and in particular their grieving parents Éad and Patsy.

U13 report

Our U13 boys played in Division 1 in both the Spring & Autumn leagues. The leagues were both development leagues with no semi-finals or finals. Our low panel numbers (18) meant that we did not always have enough players born in 2010 for all matches. We worked closely with the coaches on the U12 team and used 5 different players from 2009 born U12s for matches at various stages during the year. Continued to work on the team environment and good communication with the parent group. All in all a very enjoyable year and the boys are looking forward to moving onto the full-sized pitch next year!

U15 report

The U15 boys had a very productive year across 3 competitions. In addition, we also played 10 challenge matches throughout the season. Below is a summary of how we faired in the respective competitions:

Feile:

We played the Meath County Division 2 Feile competition in early May under great conditions in Kells. We had 3 matches in a tough group which included Walterstown, Ratoath and Gaeil Colmcille. Ladies Senior and Junior Team

After a very successful and eventful 2022 season, our ladies teams went into 2023 with optimism and a real sense of drive to push on this season. Winning Div 1 league and reaching a first Senior final, along with an unlucky Junior A quarter final loss, meant that our group were hungry for further improvement from the first week in January 2023.

With a large group starting their running in the cold of January, everything was geared towards challenging in both Div 1 and Div 4 league which kicked off at the end of February. We started how we meant to go on, and won our first 2 leagues games, away to St. Michaels (Div 1) and at home to Dunboyne B (Div 4). Unfortunately for our Div 1 team, it would be a rollercoaster league campaign, with further impressive wins against Simonstown and Seneschalstown, but poor performances led to losses against Donaghmore / Ashbourne, Dee Rangers and Dunboyne. Injuries played a big part to inconsistency in Div 1, but it also led to many of our u16 / u17 players getting regular game time at a very high level. Our Div 4 team would fare much better in terms of results for the remainder of their league, winning all of their matches with some exceptional performances on the way. It meant we were looking forward to another Div 4 league final, against a strong Gaeil Colmcille team. Thankfully, we came out on the right end of the result, and this started what would turn out to be a successful season on the trophy front for this group. 41 different players participated in Div 4 league over the 8 games, which shows the depth of talent which is within the club at this moment.

After a few post league holidays, and championship getting closer, the Masita Cup took centre stage for the month of July. In a very difficult group, a draw against St Ultans and 2 wins against Skryne & Oldcastle, meant we had a semi final meeting against St Colmcilles in Pilltown. In what was a tight game, the Dunshaughlin girls pulled away in the final 10 minutes to win by 8 points over the 2022 winners. This win set up a final meeting with a Walterstown team who had been performing extremely well in 2023. However, with more of a settled group now, Royal Gaels ran out emphatic winners by 35 points. This turned out to be great preparation for our Senior and Junior A championships.

Both of our teams were drawn in the toughest possible groups for championship, with our seniors facing newly promoted neighbours Skryne, 2018 & 2019 Senior champions Simonstown, and 3 in a row Champions Dunboyne. Our Junior A group was even tougher, with 2 of the championship favourites St Patricks and Walterstown drawn, along with old foes Dunboyne B. On the 19th & 20th August, we got our championships underway with a hard fought win against Skryne in the senior, followed by a defeat against a strong St Pats team in Stamullen. The second round would follow the same outcome with the Senior team showing a very mature performance against a resolute Simonstown, before our Juniors were comprehensively beaten by Walterstown. However, round 3 was where the excitement really kicked in, with 2 games against Dunboyne in 2 days. On both days, we got the end result we needed, which was topping our group in Senior, and progressing to quarter final in Junior A. All attention focused on Moynalvey in the first of the knockout games in Junior A. We were extremely unlucky not to come away with a win against the soon to be finalists, and our girls can be extremely proud of the effort put in.

For the next week, all eyes were on a repeat of round 1, and a meeting with Skryne. With Skryne believing they should have won a few weeks earlier, our girls hit their stride and looked comfortable after 20 minutes, mirroring the same route we had to a final in 2022. However, there was a different mindset and belief in 2023. Going into another battle with Dunboyne, confidence was high for the biggest day in the Meath ladies club calendar. Standing Orders/Bunordaithe

Definition: The Rules of Debate at the AGM are referred to as "Standing Orders."

- 1. The Proposer of a Resolution or of an Amendment thereto may speak for four minutes.
- 2. A delegate speaking to a Resolution or of an Amendment must not exceed three minutes.
- 3. The Proposer of a Resolution or an Amendment may speak a second time for three minutes before a vote is taken, but no other delegate may speak a second time to the same Resolution or Amendment.
- 4. The Chairman may at any time he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed call on the proposer for a reply, and when that has been given a vote must be taken.
- 5. A delegate may, with the consent of the Chairman, move "that the question be now put", after which when the proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.
- 6. Where the AGM considers it appropriate, a vote may be by secret ballot.
- 7. A speaker to the Annual Report or to any other general discussion shall not exceed four minutes to any one topic.
- 8. Any motion seeking additions or amendments to the Constitution or Rules must have a majority equal to two-thirds of those present, entitled to vote and voting.
- 9. Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter not on the Agenda except by the consent of a majority equal to two-thirds of those present, entitled to vote and voting.
- 10. The Chairman may change the order of items on the agenda with the support of a simple majority of those present, entitled to vote and voting.
